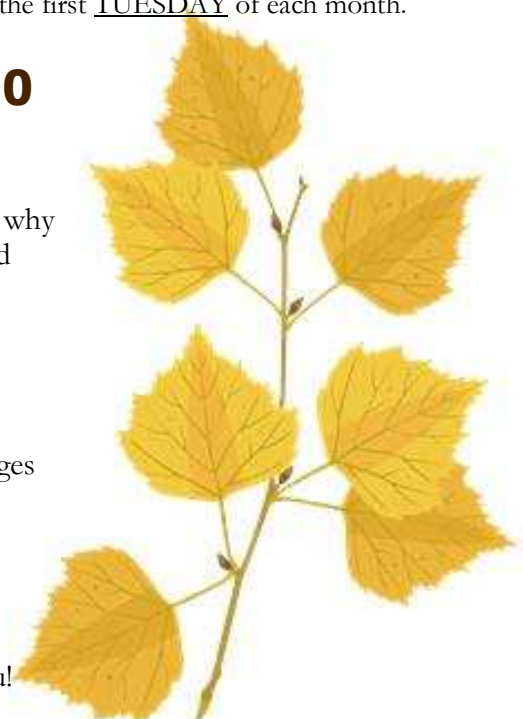

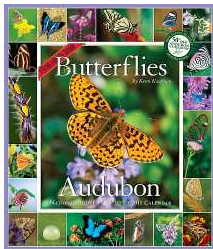
Autumn is fast approaching, with cooling temperatures and birds moving from summer to winter homes. Amazingly, some warblers and shorebirds begin their journey as early as late July. Spring and fall seasons are highlights of a birder's year. It's the best time to see a wide variety of migrating species.

While field trips are fun, I wanted to take this time to remind you that migrants are also close to home. In a treasure of a place, unknown to even many long-time members, the Burroughs Audubon Library and Nature Center is nestled at the northwest corner of Lake Jacomo. For almost 40 years, Jackson County Parks and Recreation has generously provided us with a house and grounds, formerly a park biologist's home, allowing us to create a beautiful and educational sanctuary. Now, thanks to the Library Committee and other dedicated volunteers, it's looking better than ever! After last fall's prairie burning, beautiful and plentiful prairie wildflowers are blooming, attracting butterflies and sheltering families of bluebirds and towhees. Native plant gardens maturing near the building provide nectar for hummingbirds. Our extensive library contains not only books about birds and naturalists' writings, but it also contains volumes about plants, reptiles, and mammals from all over the world. Over 6,000 books are available for checkout and reference. We provide free handouts on birds, bird feeding, conservation issues and habitat improvement. We have examples of Audubon's inimitable artwork and material on the history of National Audubon and our own Burroughs chapter, thriving for over 90 years. We also have a little gift shop that sells seed, feeders, and gifts for every bird lover of every age.

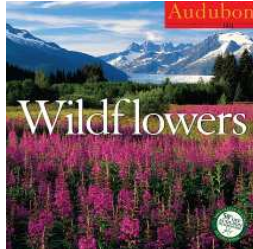

Thanks to our friends at the Wild Bird Center in Prairie Village, new feeding stations will accommodate more birds and augment an already impressive list of species that visit throughout the year. Louisiana Coastal Initiative Needs Our Help *by Heidi Retherford*

Every day, Louisiana loses an area of coastal wetlands equivalent to about 32 football fields--one of the fastest land-loss rates in the world. Four Burroughs Audubon Board Members, Nic Allen, Michael O'Keefe, Heidi Retherford, and Jill DeWitt (Past President, Burroughs Audubon; also of Audubon Missouri) visited Louisiana to study the problem and find out what could be done to help.

Approximately 3.2 million waterfowl and shorebirds spend the winter in southern Louisiana. 360 species of birds move through Louisiana's wetlands during spring or fall migration. After touring Louisiana's coast, Nic Allen remarked, "I was amazed at the bird diversity that is present in the Delta. It emphasizes the importance of this area as a bird stop-over during migration." Jill DeWitt agreed, "Coastal restoration would provide critical habitat for Roseate Spoonbills, Clapper Rails, plovers, and Tri-colored Herons, as well as a storm buffer for greater New Orleans in a time of rapid climate change."

Wetlands are Louisiana's first line of defense against hurricane force winds and flooding from storms. Scientists estimate that every mile of wetlands can trim three to nine inches off a storm surge. When wetlands deteriorate, it costs taxpayers millions of dollars to repair storm damage that could have been avoided if natural coastal wetlands were there as a buffer. Louisiana's coastal wetlands also support a productive seafood industry as it provides shrimp and other seafood to our local restaurants and they protect a port

and energy infrastructure that serves the nation. As Michael O'Keefe emphasized, "With the erosion taking place along the coast, this oil and gas infrastructure is becoming more exposed to damage from storm surges."

Heidi Retherford explains, "There are two main causes for this deterioration in wetlands. First, sediments that formerly flowed down the Mississippi River to rebuild the Louisiana coast are being impeded. Our own Missouri River once contributed 70 percent of the sediments that flowed down to the Mississippi River Delta. Over many decades, dams and levees were built to control and inhibit the flow of the Mississippi River system to protect people and businesses from naturally occurring floods. However, these dams and levees prevent sediments and silts from flowing down to the Mississippi River Delta to naturally rebuild coastal wetlands.

Secondly, along the Louisiana coast, oil drilling companies, as well as the Mississippi River Gulf Outlet have cut navigation channels into coastal marshes along the Gulf of Mexico. These channels have exposed wetlands to saltwater, which gradually destroys wetland habitat."

Burroughs Audubon, the National Audubon Society, The Nature Conservancy, and the National Wildlife Federation are all partnering with the Environmental Defense Fund in a national effort to restore Louisiana's coastal wetlands and to help protect people, birds and wildlife from the effects of hurricanes and climate change.

We encourage you, as a Burroughs Audubon member, to become actively involved in the Missouri River

Initiative to restore Louisiana's coastal wetlands. Please join us at Burroughs Audubon's General Meeting on October 5 at the Anita B. Gorman Discovery Center to learn more about these issues.

Encourage funding for coastal restoration. Let them know that restoring wetlands and coastal areas is critical to the safety of New Orleans and other coastal communities.

Gulf Oil Spill Update

The environmental impact of what is now reckoned as the largest oil spill in U.S. history continues to unfold. Oil is now being seen from Louisiana to Alabama, and beaches of the Florida Panhandle are now threatened with oiling.

Over 22,000 volunteers have registered with the National Audubon Society to help with the oil spill. Those with HAZMAT training, wildlife rescue experience, and unemployed local residents are being deployed first.

The Gulf oil disaster has already reached a dozen of Audubon's Important Bird Areas (IBAs) in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, and Florida, and more IBAs will soon be threatened. Their crucial importance to birds and wildlife has not only earned many of these areas recognition as IBAs, but led to their federal designation as National Seashore sites, National Wildlife Refuges and Wildlife Management Areas. Approximately 3.2 million waterfowl and shorebirds spend the winter in southern Louisiana alone, and 360 species of birds move through Louisiana's wetlands during spring or fall migration.

Preventing oil from reaching more of these sites and protecting nesting birds on beaches and in wetlands is the highest immediate conservation priority. But as the oil continues to spew, Audubon is also focused on the inevitable need for long term recovery and restoration. Audubon's current efforts in the Gulf Coast include:

- Marshalling volunteer resources to help with wildlife rescue, clean-up, and to support heroic emergency responders.
- Monitoring response efforts and guiding them toward designated Important Bird areas and sites in need of special protection.
- Researching bird and habitat impacts to inform recovery efforts.
- Leading restoration of resources along the Gulf Coast for the long-term
- Alerting the public to risks to birds and fragile resources
- Working for safer energy solutions
- Working to support sound public policy

On June 10, 2010, we lost a great champion with the passing of George Scheil, 86, of Raytown, Missouri. George, along with his wife of 65 years, Alice, have been tireless volunteers for the Friends of Squaw Creek, Burroughs Audubon Society and numerous other civic and nature organizations.

While George and Alice have been named "Volunteer of the Year" multiple times by the groups they have been involved in, those awards are still hard pressed to recognize the efforts they put forth and more importantly results that they have achieved.

George was THE leader in forming the Friends of Squaw Creek back in 2000 after spending years in combination with thousands of volunteer hours under the National Audubon Society Adopt-A-Refuge program in conjunction with Burroughs Audubon Society. The Friends of Squaw Creek has allowed for a unification of volunteer efforts for people from Kansas City, St. Joseph and more importantly the Mound City area. George used his influence and persuasion to raise over \$300,000 in funding, almost single handedly, including an appropriation from Congress and related funds from the state that allowed for the addition of the auditorium to Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge's Headquarters and the (appropriately named) George L. Scheil Outdoor Classroom.

George was also a tireless recruiter, bringing fresh faces and energy into the conservation fold. This has helped establish a base of activism and involvement that will continue to reap the rewards of George's efforts into the future. Thanks, George! We'll miss you.

Birdathon Update: Roadrunners Identify Most Birds

In the all day category with 128 species, the Roadrunners with team members Mike Stoakes, Gary Johnson, Don Stout and Paul Habiger won the friendly competition by identifying the most bird species in the 2010 Burroughs Audubon Birdathon. The results for the other teams were the Waxwing Warriors with team members Shari Harden, Sherry Leonardo, Lori Lind, Michael O'Keefe, and Karen Stair with 114 species and the Girlie Birders with team members Laura Robinson, Susan Rohrmeier, Sara Scheil, Becky Selzer, and Barbara VanVleck with a total of 103 species.

This year we had a team entry in the part day Birdathon category. The Lesser Yellowlegs team with members David Butel, Marshall Coleman, Paul Habiger, Gary Johnson, Hilda Mendez, and Heidi Retherford had a very wet day birding but still managed to identify 82 species. The area they covered was limited to the Greater Kansas City area.

Due to the wet stormy weather encountered by the teams on their count days, species total were less than the past years. Never the less, the teams altogether identified 164 different species with eight of the species being on Audubon's Red Watch List. Species on the "Red List" are declining rapidly and/or have very small populations or limited ranges, and face major conservation threats. These typically are species of global conservation concern.

Birdathon was again, a very successful fundraiser just as in years past. Pledges raised by the teams have totaled more than \$2500 to date. Thanks to all for your generous support of Burroughs Audubon.
